View from the Dome

From Orlando, Florida, to Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, this year I have had the opportunity to meet with a wide variety of people hailing from all walks of life through participation in agricultural meetings and radionics workshops. These events are always a wonderful learning experience not only for the participants but also for me as an instructor. Invariably the questions raised and challenges associated with teaching radionics serve to strengthen my own understanding of the subtleties of the art.

For example, recently I saw an amazing thing in a *Fundamentals of Radionics* workshop, where we had a group of 18 participants – a mix of brand new and experienced researchers. Now, my greatest fear in a class like this is that we will have a new user who cannot get a “stick” on the reaction plate/antenna. I am certain that I will be able to teach every other element that must be conveyed to prepare the student to do basic radionics, but if he or she cannot get any response on the rub plate it is almost impossible to move forward.



Out of this group, 16 of the participants got a nice strong reaction immediately and were analyzing with confidence within the first half hour. The 17th person took a little longer, but within the first two hours it was smooth sailing for him as well. But the last fellow – the 18th man - was totally stuck and getting no response of any kind from his instrument. We tried replacing the basic rub plate with a large Phase Array Antenna. We tried adjusting his position and posture. And each time the class would start a new exercise, I would come find the stick for him - show him exactly where he should find it on the dial. But the poor fellow rubbed and rubbed and rubbed and never got the slightest tingle even while everyone around him was obviously getting the readings with greater ease as the hours and days rolled on.

And then all at once in the middle of an exercise on the morning of the *third day* he suddenly shouted, "Its tingling! I'm getting it!" and everyone else in the room cheered. Once he broke through it came very easily, such that by the end of that day and all through the Advanced Class he was doing as well as his classmates. What did I learn? I left that class convinced that *anyone* can learn to do radionics if they will persevere and spend the time to find the subtlety of the sensation. And I was reminded that when the going gets tough sometimes there is no other answer but to buckle down and refuse to quit or surrender.

What a wonderful tool we have in radionics!
